What is Sea-Buckthorn?

Sea-Buckthorn (Hippophae L.) is a multipurpose plant, which meets short term economic needs of the people and long term environmental conservation. It is an excellent fuel wood, fodder and soil binder, a hardy plant which can tolerate extreme climate (-40 to +40 degree Celsius). It grows naturally in Ladakh region and is widely distributed in the Nubra region of Leh. Sea buckthron berries are highly nutritive and are quite rich in vitamin C (300-2400 mg/100g), vitamin A, E and K, protein, organic acid, carotenoids, flavonoids and steroids, which are used in Russia, Mongolia and China for the production of medicines, cosmetics and food products.

Following the transfer of Sea-buckthorn based technology by the Defense Institute of High Altitude Research (DIHAR) to a private firm in year 2001, collection of the berries has become an important income generating activity. The harvest period is short while the return is high. Popularity of the Sea-Buckthorn as a source of income can be judged from the appreciation in price of the fresh berry from Rs. 8 per kg in the year 2001 to Rs. 65 per kg in 2021. Currently, the demand for Sea-Buckthorn far exceeds the supply capacity of the region.

Ladakh remains the major site for natural Sea-Buckthorn resource with over 70% of the total area (13,000 hectares) under Sea-Buckthorn in the country. Despite the vast area under natural forest, the mean annual berry harvest is less than 5% of the total available Sea-buckthorn resource in the region. This becomes the very objective of initiating this kind of project in the valley which focuses on maximizing the cultivation, harvest and post-harvest processing of the Sea-Buckthorn fruit and also providing skill-based training to the local youth in order to induce their entrepreneurship skills and make them financially independent for a better tomorrow.

Charting the sea-buckthorn path in the Nubra region.

The Swavalamban LEAP project team visited various villages across Nubra Valley to engage with the local community and officials. The objective was to gain insights into the region's sea-buckthorn cultivation, assess its geographical coverage, and understand local market scenarios. The team also gathered valuable information on harvesting, processing, and potential opportunities for expanding the sea buckthorn industry in Nubra.

Data Validation & Stakeholder Interaction

At the beginning of 2021, the project team conducted data validation and engaged with primary sea-buckthorn processors in Nubra. The objective was to identify constraints, gaps, and key challenges in the value chain while gathering insights and suggestions for improvement. This interaction provided a deeper understanding of the processing landscape and potential opportunities for strengthening the sea-buckthorn industry in the region.

Key Meeting on Project Establishment & Future Planning with Government Officials of Leh (June 3, 2023)

A detailed meeting was held on June 3, 2023, to discuss the establishment of the Swavalamban-LEAP Project in Nubra and strategies for moving forward. A major focus of the discussion was securing support from the local government to ensure the project's success. Several key officials participated in the meeting, both in person and virtually.

One of the key proposals was to involve Dr. Mohd Abass from the District Rural Development Committee (DRC) to leverage his expertise in rural enterprise development.

Discussions were also held regarding obtaining a 3-phase electrical connection for the project center in Lakjung. The connection line is 50 meters away, and Shri Rigzen Lundup, Councilor, LAHDC, took charge of coordinating this requirement. The Deputy Commissioner assured support in arranging funds for the installation.

Another critical point was the coordination with the Cooperative Office and the District Industries Centre (DIC). A proposal was made to convert the enterprise into a cooperative for sustained oversight and support. Additionally, discussions were held on integrating PMFME funds and subsidies with the Swavalamban-LEAP project to enhance opportunities for entrepreneurs. DIC members, Ms. Beronica and Mr. Tundop, were actively involved in this discussion.

Several other forms of government support and assistance were also discussed to ensure the project's long-term sustainability and success in Nubra.



Logistics & Renovation for the Swavalamban-LEAP Center

Given Nubra Valley's high-altitude location and the high cost of purchasing materials locally, all necessary items for the center were transported from Delhi and Srinagar. The identified building, which had been abandoned for years, underwent extensive renovation both inside and outside to make it fully functional for the project.

Additionally, toilet facilities were constructed, along with a borewell for water supply. Separate septic tanks were installed for both the toilets and the processing unit, ensuring proper sanitation and waste management.



Swavalamban-LEAP Center







The Swayalamban-LEAP Center in Nubra Valley, Leh, has undergone a remarkable transformation. Initially constructed as a local school, the building was abandoned for over four years due to its remote location on the outskirts of the village. At the time of abandonment, the structure lacked essential amenities such as painting, windows, lighting, water facilities, and proper road

access.

After securing a lease from the educational department of Leh, the project team renovated the building, making it accessible and usable for the community. The renovations included installing toilets, providing electricity through a genset (as grid connection was unavailable), painting, and overall building restoration, along with improving road access to the site. This transformation has

Transformation of abandend Auditorium into a Fully Functional Processing Unit

To meet the requirements of a processing unit, a proper sewage system, floor leveling, and a 3-phase electrical connection were essential. To accommodate these needs, the building's auditorium was fully renovated and transformed into a fully operational processing lab equipped with the following:



- Pulper Super Deluxe Extracts pulp from sea buckthorn berries.
- Fruit Mill Crushes sea buckthorn fruits for further processing.
- Steam Jacketed Kettle (Tilting Type) Cooks or processes sea buckthorn products.
- Steam Jacketed Kettle (Stationery Type) Heats or cooks large batches of sea buckthorn products.
- Inline Homogeniser Ensures uniform texture in sea buckthorn products.
- Hydraulic Juice Press Extracts juice from sea buckthorn berries.
- Boiler Generates steam for processing sea buckthorn.
- Decorticator Removes seeds or pits from fruits.



- Oil Expeller Cold Press Extracts oil from sea buckthorn seeds.
- Vacuum Filling Machine Fills processed products into glass bottles.
- Pneumatic Filter Filters sea buckthorn juice or oil.
- Crown Corking Machine Seals bottles
- Screw Cap Sealing Machine Seals containers
- Dryer / Dehydrator Dries sea buckthorn berries or pulp.
- Pulverizer Grinds sea buckthorn materials into fine powder.
- Extra Spares and Accessories Trays, Tables, Storage and Mixing Tanks, Wooden Crate, Hydraulic cloths, etc...

Now, the processing lab stands as the Biggest Processing Unit in all of Nubra, providing a facility that the entire community can utilize.
